Scout should go to: <http://www.meritbadge.com/worksheets/index.htm> and obtain the worksheet for First Aid and **bring to workday completed.** Merit Badge cards will not be handed out until worksheet is complete particularly section on Requirement #7 – Teaching First Aid to another scout. If a scout does not have access to the Internet he may contact me for a worksheet.

PRE-REGISTRATION REQUIRED

Come join us for the Osage District's Eleventh Annual First Aid Merit Badge Skill Center. We will have an exciting day of learning about medical emergencies and how to handle them through lectures, videos and lot of "hands on training." We are staffed with First Aid Merit badge counselors, health and fire professionals. At the end of the day you should have completed and earned the First Aid Merit Badge if you participate in all activities and bring a completed worksheet. Scouts should be at least Tenderfoot level.

Send in registration early. Registration starts when you receive this and closes when full.

Scouts can be added to a waiting list. The class limit is 32 scouts.

Troop leaders and parents are invited to stay for the day.

You may copy this form. Troops may send in all registrants together. Scouts cannot leave the classroom during the day unless accompanied by an adult so bring lunch.

BE PREPARED – PREREQUISITES

1. Read and bring your copy of the First Aid Merit Badge book.
2. Read the First Aid chapter in you Boy Scout handbook. Bring your handbook.
3. Bring a first aid kit that you have made for your personal use. Use items from home. (requirement 2b)
4. If you are currently CPR certified bring your red card.
5. Bring a sack lunch and drink. Scouts will not be able to leave the building unless they are accompanied by an adult.
6. Wear a scout neckerchief or bolo and be in uniform.
7. You do not need to bring a merit badge card.
8. Using the worksheet at www.meritbadge.com complete the information for the First Aid Merit Badge and bring this to the workday.

 - B) Identify the conditions that must exist before performing CPR on a person.
 - C) Demonstrate proper technique in performing CPR using a training device approved by your counselor.
 - D) Show the steps that need to be taken for someone suffering from a severe laceration on the leg and on the wrist. Tell the dangers in the use of a tourniquet and the conditions under which its use is justified.
 - E) Explain when a bee sting could be life threatening and what action should be taken for prevention and for first aid.
 - F) Explain the symptoms of heat stroke and what action needs to be taken for first aid and for prevention.
